A Pacific University Bachelor's Degree is comprised of 3 parts: Major, Core, and Electives. This guide is designed to help you select foundation courses for your major. Use this guide in conjunction with the "Pacific University Transfer Guide for Clackamas Community College" which addresses selecting courses to meet our Core requirements. Future transfer students should discuss with a Pacific Advisor the amount of foundation courses for your major and the amount of core you should plan to transfer to Pacific. If you have questions regarding major selection or emphasis selection (for Environmental Studies and International Studies), the Advising Center or Admissions Office will connect you with a Faculty Advisor in your proposed major.

- Only courses of “C-” or higher will be considered for transfer credit
- To graduate from Pacific you need 124 semester hours (186 quarter hours). 30 of the last 40 semester hours must be from Pacific.
- Quarter credits transfer at 2/3 credit, i.e. 90 quarter credits = 60 semester credits (junior class standing)
